Willie Mays' life changed not because of his amazing abilities, hard work, and charisma alone. He would have still had those pressing pants. Willie credited the life he actually lived to the people who helped him when he was young — who taught him, coached him, helped him grow strong and healthy, treated him with respect, saw his potential, sacrificed for him, and showed him how to be the man he became.

Willie never forgot that. He made it his life's mission to honor the kindness of those who gave him his chance, by paying their kindness forward to other kids growing up as he did. He wanted to see the greatest treasures of his amazing life go back to his fans, and to raise money to help those kids reach their own potential. Willie said his ultimate legacy was not going to be his performance on the field or the honors he racked up, but what he did with all that success to help the next Willie Mays. "You can only play baseball for so many years," he said. "But you can help many people every day that you're alive and even after you're gone."

You don't have to be born a legend, Willie said, to have a good life. You just need to work hard at what you're good at and have good people around you to help. And you don't have to be famous to change a child's life.
